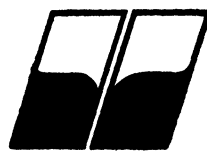

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INDIAN INSTITUTE OF MANAGEMENT, BANGALORE

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1. THE INSTITUTE :

The Indian Institute of Management, Bangalore (IIM-B) was established in October 1973, by the Union Ministry of Education in cooperation with the Government of Karnataka. It is the third in the series of national institutes of management set up in the country, after the ones in Calcutta and Ahmedabad. The fourth one has recently come up at Lucknow. These Institutes of Management were established to further the cause of professionalism in management in the country.

This being an autonomous institution, its affairs are governed by the IIM-B Society (A Society registered under the State Law) and a Board of Governors comprising representatives of the Union Government and of the Government of Karnataka, the All India Council of Technical Education, Karnataka Chamber of Commerce, All India Management Association, National Productivity Council and others. The Chairman of the Society and the Board is appointed by the Government of India.

The main thrust of the Institute's academic and research activities is focussed on providing higher management education and professional training in relevant disciplines. In addition, the Institute is engaged in publication of management literature, provision of consultancy services to government, industry and other agencies.

The essence of IIM-B perspectives is 'social relevance'. Consistent with the past, there have been laudable achievements

in the Institute's educational programmes, research efforts, extension of consultancy services, during the year under report.

2. THE CAMPUS :

Currently the Institute's campus is situated on a 100-acre plot of land at 10th K.M. on Bannerghatta Road, close to the southern outskirts of the Bangalore City. The construction work having started in October 1978 on the land donated by the State Government of Karnataka, the first phase segment comprising a major portion of the administrative block, the faculty and institutional blocks, dormitories and 70 staff houses have been completed and occupied. The second phase of construction activities consisting of several institutional facilities and staff houses, which started during the year 1983-84, registered steady progress. Details are at APPENDIX - I.

3. GOVERNANCE :

Mr.V.Krishnamurthy, Chairman and Managing Director of M/s. Maruthi Udyog Limited was the Chairman of the Society and the Board of Governors till 31st August 1984. He was succeeded by Shri.Abid Hussain, Member, Planning Commission, who is currently the Chairman of the Society and the Board. In the absence of a permanent Director being in position, Prof.N.Krishnaswamy, the then seniormost Dean, acted as the Director during the year under report.

Composition of the Board as on 31st March 1985 was as shown in APPENDIX - II.

MEETINGS OF GOVERNING BODIES:

The Society met once during the year under report on 16th April 1984. The Board met twice, on 16th April 1984 and on 22nd August 1984. The Executive Committee of the Board also met twice during the year under report.

The following changes took place in the composition of the Board during the year 1984-85.

- i) Shri.Mohinder Singh was nominated as Member of the Board in April 1984 vice Shri.M.Subramanian, Additional Secretary, Union Ministry of Rural Development.
- ii) Prof.Ashok Chandra, Educational Adviser (T), Union Ministry of Education was nominated Member of the Board in September 1984 vice Dr.D.S.Walia.
- iii) Shri.P.Murari, Additional Secretary, Union Ministry of Industry, was nominated Member of the Board in September 1984 vice Shri.R.N.Chopra.
- iv) Shri.L.S.Narayanan, Financial Adviser, Union Ministry of Education, was nominated Member of the Board in March 1985 vice Shri.Manmohan Singh.

4. POST GRADUATE PROGRAMME :

The principal academic activity of the Institute is the Post Graduate Programme in Management. Specialization offered in this Programme were in Sectors like Transportation, Energy and Power, Environmental Studies, Population and Health, and Agriculture and Rural Development and Areas like Production and Operations Management, Operations Research and Quantitative Methods, Organizational Behaviour and Industrial Relations, Economics and Social Sciences, Marketing, and Finance and Control.

The curriculum seeks to inculcate entrepreneurial values and promote functional skills. In order to meet the instructional needs and trigger innovative effort at specialisation in sectors, centres of studies have been established within the Institute.

a) ADMISSIONS :

An advertisement for Post Graduate Programme and Fellowship Programme was issued in all leading newspapers on September 1984. 19,778 candidates applied for the COMMON ADMISSIONS TEST (CAT). The Common Admissions Test was administered on 16th December 1984. The details relating to the number of students who took the test at different test centres are given in APPENDIX - III.

9,497 candidates had applied for Admissions to the Institute's PGP and 132 candidates for the Fellowship Programme. On the basis of the written test and considering the background, 819 candidates including SC/ST were called for interview. The details of the candidates who applied for the test and finally admitted for 1985-87 are given below:

Finally 107 candidates joined the Institute. The details regarding the number of candidates who actually appeared for the interview is given in APPENDIX - IV.

5. FELLOWSHIP PROGRAMME :

An advertisement was also issued inviting applications for admission to the programme. 132 candidates appeared for the test. Out of 8 candidates who were called for interview, two finally succeeded in getting the offer. Details are given in APPENDIX - V.

6. SUPPORTING FACILITIES :

a) SCHOLARSHIPS :

The Institute offers Merit-cum-Means Scholarship of Rs.170/- per month with the tuition fee waiver for 25% of the total number of students enrolled for PGP. During 1984-85 a total of 51 such scholarships were awarded. Besides, scholarships were also awarded by the following organizations.

As in the past the SC/ST students who were not recipients of other scholarships, continued to enjoy waiver of tuition fee, course material fee, contribution to SWF and room rent (for hostel residents). They were also in receipt of stipend of Rs.150-/ per month from the Institute.

b) HOSTELS:

The Institute continued to maintain two self-contained hostels, one at the campus and the other at I-Block Jayanagar. The resident students are accommodated in the well-equipped hostels, where mess facilities are monitored by the students Mess Committee of the respective hostels.

c) LIBRARY :

The Institute's Library which is currently housed in the Northern wing of the Administrative Block, provides book-lending, reading room and reference services. During the year under report, the collection of books went upto 82294 titles including 7599 back volumes of periodicals. It has a good collection of government publications, technical reports and conferences proceedings, annual reports and reports of public and private enterprises, academic and scientific publications. It has been possible for the library to obtain and supply reprints of articles at short notices through INSDDC, British Council and direct contacts with information centres abroad. Micro-film reader, microfiche reader, projectors and recorders increase the utility of the Library. Documentation services like Current Awareness Service, Press Cutting Service, Bibliography Service and Reference Service make the spectrum of Library activity complete. The details relating to the statistical data regarding collection, circulation, budget are given in APPENDIX - VI.

d) COMPUTER CENTRE:

The Centre consists of 512K size ORG-80 System which operates in the multiprogramming mode. Installation of the system, which began two years ago, is now under full utilization. The system is under extensive use for PGP and FPM work.

Functioning of the operating system has improved since installation and a numerical processor has now been added which is expected to result in improved performance in terms of time utilization.

Projects have been undertaken to develop systems to handle payrolls, financial account, research and consultancy accounting, PF accounting, and library circulation counter accounting. The computer centre is also assisting in processing data relating to PGP admissions.

The Centre also has a HP 945d desk top computer, which is used mainly by Research Fellows and Faculty members for Software Development. It is proposed to expand its capability by adding a disk and a printer.

7. PLACEMENT :

a) FINAL :

During the year under report, there were 102 students in out-going 10th batch for final placement and 97 students in the first year (including one from FPM) in the 11th batch for summer placement. All the graduates were suitably placed. The average salary was about Rs.2,000/- per month. The final data relating to placement are given below:

During the year under report, 82 organizations participated in the Campus Recruitment Programme. Out of these, 14 were from the Public Sector and 68 from Private Sector Organizations. 82 students were offered placement in Public Sector and 19 students in Private Sector organizations.

b) SUMMER :

83 students were provided with project facilities through placement. Out of the remaining 14 students, 2 had sponsorships and 12 sought projects on their own. The students were paid stipends ranging from Rs.600/- to Rs.1200/- per month.

41 organizations visited the campus for selection of students for the projects. Of these 30 were placed in the public sector and 53 in private sector organizations.

8. STUDENTS ACTIVITIES :

The Institute hosted during October 1984 the Inter-IIM Meet in which students from both IIM-Calcutta and IIM-Ahmedabad participated. On this occasion, the Students' Association brought out a magazine entitled 'IMBIBE'.

Our students participated in a number of inter-collegiate Quizzes, Just-A-Minute Programmes, Elocution Competitions etc organized by various educational institutions in Bangalore.

The students won the prestigious Sen Gupta Memorial Trophy and many other prizes during these inter-collegiate competitions. The students also participated in other cultural activities which included hystronics, music, skits, etc.

9. CONVOCATION :

The 9th Annual Convocation of the Institute was held on 10th April 1984. Shri.T.S.Satish Chandran, IAS, Chief Secretary to the Government of Karnataka, delivered the Convocation address, 127 PGP students and 2 Fellowship students received their respective diplomas at the Convocation.

10. MANAGEMENT DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMMES (MDPs) :

MDPs serve the twin objective of imparting management knowledge to executives from industries and governmental organizations and of establishing links with practising professionals for the purpose of collecting cases focussing on real life situations. We conduct a large number of MDPs in various functional areas of management as well as in Sectors other than business/industry. Typically, the programmes are of one to two weeks' duration, the exceptions being 12-week-long USAID sponsored programmes.

The MDPs are currently held in hotels for want of suitable facilities at the campus. Once the MDP complex is ready (which is likely to take 2-3 years for completion of construction), it would help save substantial expenditure, which will augment Institute revenues.

During the year under review, the performance of the Institute with respect to MDPs was satisfactory in terms of

the number of programmes offered and the gross revenue generated from these programmes. 35 Programmes were organized and a gross revenue of Rs.19,20,950 - one of the highest in recent years - was generated. The year-wise break-down of gross revenue from the MDPs and of participants are given in APPENDIX - VII & VIIA.

530 senior and middle level executives and officials participated in the programmes which worked out to 15 participants per programme, the details whereof are given in APPENDIX -VIII. The names of faculty leaders who coordinated programmes and the gross revenue earned therefrom are given at APPENDIX - IX. Details of MDPs conducted during the year under report are given in APPENDIX - X.

Besides MDPs, 8 Seminars, including the International Seminar on Export Group Marketing on Public Enterprises and Marketing in Developing Countries and the National Seminar on Imported Technology in Public Enterprises in India, were held during the year under report.

11. ORGANIZATION BASED PROGRAMMES (OBPs) :

The Organization Based Programmes (OBPs) are specifically designed to suit the training requirements of individual organizations. During the year 1984-85, 20 OBPs were conducted, the details of which are available in APPENDIX - XI. The total programmes' duration rose to roughly 54 weeks as against 30 weeks of 19 programmes during 1983-84. The total revenue

rose to Rs.8 lakhs as compared to Rs.3.95 lakhs of 1983-84.

12. RESEARCH AND CONSULTANCY :

a) RESEARCH :

i) EXTERNALLY FUNDED RESEARCH :

During 1984-85, the Institute initiated a large number of short-term research projects and undertook several long-term research assignments. Totally, 12 research projects, including 5 externally funded projects were undertaken by various faculty members during 1984-85. It is worth mentioning here that the Institute was awarded a project on "STUDIES ON MATERNAL MORTALITY" by World Health Organization (WHO) and another project on "ENERGY CONSERVATION IN AGRICULTURAL PUMPSETS" by Tata Energy Research Institute (TERI), New Delhi. Currently, the Institute has more than 50 research assignments.

ii) INSTITUTE FUNDED RESEARCH

The Faculty of the Institute undertook short-term research projects on varied aspects of management. The seed money for these projects was provided by the Institute and normally the amount is limited to Rs.5,000/- per project because of fund restrictions. During the period under review, 11 such projects received funding internally. Though many projects spilled over to next financial year, four of them were completed.

b) CONSULTANCY :

Requests were received from a number of public sector and private sector organizations to carry out specific consultancy assignments on varied topics. During 1984-85, the Institute was awarded 12 projects generating a gross revenue of about Rs.14 lakhs. Some of the assignments undertaken were:-

- a) A Management Study of Karnataka and Kerala Electricity Boards;
- b) Manpower Planning for Irrigation Development in Tamilnadu under Irrigation on Management Training Programme (USAID Project); and
- c) Preparation of a State of the Art Report on Draught Animal Power in India.

During the year, projects worth about Rs.5 lakhs were executed and final reports submitted to client organizations. Currently, the Institute is having 34 active projects in its files.

The number of days of consultancy done by faculty members ranged from 0-62 days; with two faculty exceeding 52 days of consultancy. The average consultancy days per faculty works out to approximately 9 days. The Consultancy days logged includes OBP activities also.

The Institute is striving to

- *strengthen the research endeavours of the faculty
- *emphasise case development as an important professional activity
- *improve the quantity and quality of consultancy assignments (work)
- *seek international recognition for its research projects
- *launch a professional journal
- *pay greater attention to research in sectors which are vital to the national economy.

13. CENTER FOR COMPUTER AIDED MANAGEMENT:

This sponsored project is funded jointly by the Department of Electronics, Government of India and the UNDP. The prime concern of the centre has been to develop appropriate software for improved management services, to provide a scientific base for coordination of systems activities all over the country and develop facilities for effective utilisation of modern computer technology in management systems.

The total outlay on the project is about Rs.40 lakhs and it runs for four years.

14. SECTORAL ACTIVITIES:

a) CENTRE FOR AGRICULTURE AND RURAL DEVELOPMENT (CARD):

The Centre for Agriculture and Rural Development conducted one training programme for Irrigation and Power Engineers (WAPCOS). One training programme was also conducted on Irrigation Management for the officials from Tamilnadu. A Consultancy Project for NABARD was completed and report submitted during the year. Another one on Tribal Development Programme was in progress at the end of the year under report. A Study on Manpower Planning for the Irrigation Department in Tamilnadu was undertaken during the year and a MDP on Management in Dairy Industries was conducted.

b) CENTRE FOR HUMAN SETTLEMENTS AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDIES (CHES):

The Sector had 9 PGP students and 4 fellowship students specialising in the stream. 8 courses of study for PGP students, 2 courses for fellowship students and one short-term training programme were organized during the year. The Sector took up work on 6 research and consultancy assignments, including the Institute-sponsored ones, of which one was completed. A number of research papers and reports were published/presented.

c) TRANSPORTATION SECTOR :

The Transportation Sector addressed itself to the task of offering courses for PGP and Fellowship Programmes. The faculty involved themselves in various consultancy and research assignments of national importance. The first phase of the collaborative research with the University of Birmingham came to a fruitful conclusion and the second phase of the programme was on. Work was in progress on the four on-going assignments.

d) ENERGY SECTOR :

The major concern of the Energy Sector as usual was centered around its Post Graduate Programme and Fellowship Programmes. 32 PGP students qualified for the award of Diploma during the year under review and 30 students were enrolled for the 1984-85 batch. The Sector conducted 3 MDPs and 4 OBPs. 8 publications were also brought out during the year under report.

e) HEALTH SECTOR :

The Health Sector engaged itself in a number of teaching, training, research and consultancy activities during the year. The Sector offered six FPM and two PGP courses. In addition, training in health management was provided to WHO Fellows from developing countries. The Sector Faculty also guided the research work of a scholar sponsored under the University of California Berkely Professional Studies Programme in India. An MDP on 'Management of Primary Health Care Programmes' and an OBP on 'MIS for Health Services' sponsored by the Ministry of Health, Government of India were conducted. The research activities of the Sector included working on a project sponsored by WHO. Consultancy services were provided to the MP Government for setting up of an Institute of Health Management. The Sector faculty published half a dozen papers in professional journals.

15. AREA ACTIVITIES :

a) THE FINANCE AND CONTROL AREA :

The Finance and Control Area offered 4 core courses and 7 elective courses in PGP and 1 core course in the FPM. The area was involved in about one-third of the MDPs during the year under report and was directly responsible for about one-fourth of the MDPs.

Several OBPs were conducted during the year and the faculty of the Area provided substantial inputs in OBPs conducted by other areas. A seminar on "Divisional Performance Appraisal" organised.

A comprehensive text book entitled 'FINANCIAL MANAGEMENT' (Theory and Practice) written by Dr. Prasanna Chandra was published by Tata McGraw Hill. Another book of the same author entitled 'MANAGER'S GUIDE TO FINANCE AND ACCOUNTING' was completed. Prof. R. Vaidyanathan completed a research project on the 'ROLE OF UNINCORPORATED ENTERPRISES IN THE INDIAN ECONOMY'.

b) PRODUCTION AND OPERATIONS MANAGEMENT AREA (POMA) :

The Faculty offered 2 Production core courses for the first year and 5 stream courses for the second year PGP students. 3 MDPs were also conducted, besides co-ordinating an officers programme for Nepal Government. The Area members co-ordinated 5 OBPs and participated in other OBPs of the Institute. 2 Consultancy assignments were completed during the year under report and several case studies and research projects were also undertaken. The Faculty of the Area were actively involved in developing software packages under the UNDP Computer-Aided Management Programme.

c) MARKETING AREA :

Apart from the regular PGP activity, 4 MDPs and a few OBPs were conducted in the Marketing Area during the year. 2 Consultancy Projects, viz "STUDY OF DEVELOPMENT OF ANCILLIARY UNITS FROM MYSORE DISTRICT AND KOLAR DISTRICT" and "A STUDY OF TELEPHONE INSTRUMENTS IN BANGALORE" sponsored by TECSOK, Department of Industries and Commerce, Government of Karnataka and the Indian Telephone Industries respectively, were taken up.

d) ECONOMICS AND SOCIAL SCIENCES AREA (ESS) :

The Area offered 5 core courses and 2 elective course as part of the Post-Graduate teaching. Three of the six research papers prepared by the members of the Area were published during the year. One project entitled "PRODUCTIVITY AND TECHNOLOGICAL CHANGE IN PUBLIC SECTOR TRANSPORT EQUIPMENT INDUSTRY IN INDIA" was completed, while two research works were in progress at the end of the year. The faculty of the Area were involved in several conferences, seminars and workshops organized by various agencies, notable among them being the Government of Karnataka. They also actively participated in various academic and administrative activities.

e) OPERATIONS RESEARCH AND QUANTITATIVE RESEARCH (OR & QM) :

The Area carried out, in totality, the following work during the year: 13 Area courses for the PGP and conducted/participated in 3 other sector PGP/FPM courses. In addition, the faculty participated in a number of MDPs and OBPs. The Area also carried out/participated in 3 major research projects, both sponsored and Institute's own under CAM Project. Some of the Area Faculty were also associated in some consultancy assignments.

16. FINANCE AND ACCOUNTS :

During the year under review, the Institute received a total grant-in-aid of Rs.227.45 lakhs from the Government of India, consisting of Rs.110.00 lakhs under PLAN and Rs.117.45 lakhs under NON-PLAN.

A sum of Rs.20.57 lakhs representing the unspent balance of grant-in-aid of 1983-84 (Rs.6.70 lakhs under PLAN and Rs.13.87 lakhs) under NON-PLAN) was also utilised by the Institute for meeting its financial commitments during 1984-85.

Thus, the total grant-in-aid that was available to the Institute during the year 1984-85 was of the order of Rs.248.02 lakhs consisting of Rs.116.70 lakhs under PLAN and Rs.131.32 lakhs under NON-PLAN.

Besides the above, the Institute also generated a gross income of Rs.43.90 lakhs through its income generating activities such as MDPs, OBPs, Sponsored Research and Consultancy assignments resulting in a total receipt of the order of Rs.291.92 lakhs.

As against this, the Institute had spent Rs.114.96 lakhs under PLAN and Rs.169.33 lakhs under NON-PLAN, leaving a balance of Rs.1.74 lakhs under PLAN and Rs.5.89 lakhs under NON-PLAN as unspent grant-in-aid to be utilised during 1985-86 with the permission of the Government of India.

The Annual Accounts for 1984-85 duly audited by the Accountant General of Karnataka are placed in APPENDIX-XIII. The Audit report and certificate are awaited from the Accountant General in Karnataka.

17. STAFF WELFARE ACTIVITIES :

a) IIM EMPLOYEES' CREDIT CO-OPERATIVE SOCIETY :

The IIM Employees' Credit Co-operative Society was started in June 1974 with a membership of 78. It remained upgraded as 'A' class Society in view of its exemplary performance with membership reaching 379 during the year under review. The Institute has been offering an interest free advance facility of Rs.1 lakh which is recoverable in equal monthly instalments. The share capital of the Society rose from Rs.561/- in 1974-75 to Rs.1,39,470. The profit of the Society rose from Rs.635 in 1974-75 to Rs.48,533 in 1985.

The amount of loan disbursed during the year under review was of the volume of Rs.10,04,600 lakhs.

b) DEPARTMENTAL CANTEEN :

The Departmental Canteen continues to be run by a Committee consisting of the representatives of the Management, faculty and staff. The Institute has been offering a subsidy of 70% on the wages of the staff employed in the canteen and the necessary capital assets have been provided free by the Institute.

c) TRANSPORT FACILITY :

Transport facilities have been provided to the faculty, students and staff of the Institute and is being monitored by a Committee consisting of the representatives of the faculty, management and staff.

d) STAFF RECREATION CLUB :

The Staff Recreation Club has been organizing sports, cultural, and recreational activities in the Institute regularly. The regular televiewing facility, in-door and out-door games and the recreational facilities made available under the aegis of the Staff Recreation Club continued to be well utilized by the staff and occasionally by the students also, during the year under report. An athletics, sports and cultural meet was conducted for the benefit of members of the Club in April 1984 in which connection a valedictory function and a prize distribution ceremony were also held. Members of the staff also put up a grand cultural show as part of this programme.

e) STAFF RELATIONS :

The management and the employees continued to have a good rapport during the year under report, as a result of which it was possible to achieve significant progress in accomplishing the Institute's objectives.

f) GENERAL WELFARE :

The Institute has since implemented the Revised Employees' Welfare Fund Scheme as part of a package of welfare measures stated for implementation. Quarters were allotted to the faculty and staff under the broad guidelines set by the Committee, which was constituted for the purpose. The services of horticulture staff and hostel staff were regularised during the year under report.

18. VISITORS AND VISITING FACULTY :

a) VISITORS :

Dr. David Solomons from U.S.A., Prof J.W. Glendenning from UK, Prof. James E. Leader from US Embassy, Prof. Syed Hashim Ali, Vice-Chancellor of Osmania University, Hyderabad, Mrs. S. Grewal, Secretary, Education and Culture, Prof. Ishwar Dayal, Director, Indian Institute of Management, Lucknow, Mr. Michael Booth of the British High Commission, Mr. Ajit Banerjee of United Nations (Development and Administration Division), Mr. A. P. Samena, Department of Personnel and Administrative Reforms, New Delhi, Mr. Merihum Dagil from British Council Division, Madras and Mr. Alan Malay from British Council Division, Madras were among the notable visitors during the year. All of them had a word of praise for the Campus and the activities of the Institute. The list of visitors is at APPENDIX-XIV.

b) VISITING FACULTY :

Dr. V. Setty Pendakur of the University of British Columbia, Canada joined as Visiting Professor on 15 OCT 84 for a period of 2 months. He was affiliated to the Transport Sector. Prof. J.W. Glendenning was also a Visiting Faculty from UK who was with us for a period of five months.

c) VISITS ABROAD/ASSIGNMENTS :

Dr. B. K. Chandrashekar visited Paris to attend a Conference for a week in August-September 1984.

Dr.V.K.Tewari visited Washington in connection with the Bangalore Housing Study Project for a week in August 1984.
