


Strengthening India-Japan Ties: Insights from the Mizuho India-Japan Study Centre's 7th Foundation Day Event

The Japanese tea ceremony is a centuries-old tradition that embodies grace, mindfulness, and the essence of Japanese culture. Sado is the ceremony of serving and having matcha with meal and sweets with the Japanese spirit Omotenashi.



Adding to the cultural richness of MIJSC's Foundation Day, **Riku Kimura**, a university student from Tokyo, presented the dynamic Sooran Bushi dance. Sooran Bushi is one of Japan's most famous traditional folk dances, originating from the northern region of Hokkaido. Riku-San's performance showcased the spirit of Japanese fishermen as they sing and dance to celebrate their catch. The dance involves intricate choreography, mimicking activities like pulling nets, dragging ropes, and lifting heavy loads over their shoulders, all while moving in harmony to traditional folk tunes.





In the vote of thanks, Mr Rathnam said, "As per many beliefs across the world we know that the number seven is a sort of a magic number, a unique number in many belief systems across the world. Even in science, it is said that cells in our body regenerates between 7 and 10 years of our existence. So we are looking forward to this regeneration of the centre over the next three years of our existence"
